

MEETING THIS MONTH: FRENCH POLISHING

Long-time WPW member Jerry Murrey will present a program on French Polishing. Many members have asked about a finishing method that will provide a beautiful and smooth protective finish that does not require spray equipment or a dust-free environment to achieve. Through lecture, demonstration, and pass-around sample boards, Jerry will take us through the steps, from start to finish, of how he creates a French Polish finish. I've seen a couple of examples of Jerry's finish, and they are very nice indeed. If you have been looking for a way to widen the finishing options available to you, Jerry's typically thorough and well-thought-out approach to solving woodworking issues should give you plenty of ideas for trying your hand at this time-honored finish. – Bill James

FUTURE PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

After much thought, and discussion with Frank Woolley, I would like to consider trying a different approach to developing programs for future meetings. It's no secret that at times we have plenty of programs in the queue, and at other times (of late, too often) we don't have enough programs, such that it seems like we're always scrambling around to have programs ready. It's not entirely clear to me why this occurs, but I have an idea that I'd like to try. Simply stated, I'd like to decouple the program topic from the speaker. In other words, instead of me asking for program ideas, where it's somewhat implied that we're looking for a speaker and a subject, I'd like to focus on having a stable of speakers that we'll call the Program Team. These speakers would then be responsible for presenting one program per year, the subject of which could be up to them (perhaps a skill in which they have a strength, or something that they have always been interested in researching), or chosen from a list of topics of interest to the WPW membership (we will survey the membership). I will be privately approaching a small group of WPW members whom I believe would make a good inaugural Program Team to test out the concept. But, I obviously don't know all club members, and certainly don't know their skills, so if you're interested in being a Program Team member, please contact me (Bill@JamesWoodWorks.com).

It's important to note this Program Team approach will not be the only way that programs will be generated. Given the success of Steve Latta's WPW Saturday program and Sunday workshop, we intend to continue to vigorously pursue "outside" speakers, with the goal of having one per year as our finances allow. Additionally, if a WPW member has an idea for a program presentation, they will always be welcomed to do so (essentially, just as we do it now); that is, there is no need to be a Program Team member to volunteer to put on a program.

Another benefit of this Program Team approach is that it dovetails nicely with Frank Woolley's desire to increase the number of people actively participating in running the WPW. That's not to say that the time commitment of being a Program Team member will be huge, because it won't, but spreading the work around a little will make it easier for all involved. Additionally, having a larger group responsible for programs will bring new ideas, approaches, and personalities out in the open. It might also turn out that once people get a taste for helping with a program once a year, they may be willing to take on one of the other Board positions so that we can constantly rotate people in and out of positions to help make our club grow, prosper, and stay relevant to our members' interests.

I sincerely welcome all comments (positive or negative) or other ideas on how we can improve our program generation, and ask for your patience as we implement this idea and work out the inevitable bugs. --Bill James
